

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From the Editor

Welcome to the June issue of the Diseworth Dialogue.



What has become an annual event – the Scarecrow Festival and Open Gardens weekend - is almost upon us and it is rumoured that this year's event will be even better than previous years. A scarecrow workshop will be held in the parish church on Saturday 9th June. See church pages for more details. Dear friends

“Send down the Holy Spirit upon your servant Julie Ann for the office and work of a priest in your church.”

These are the words that Bishop Tim will pray for Julie Ann at the service of ordination to the priesthood. Whether or not you will be there on 30th June at 5.30pm at the cathedral, I trust you will be praying for Julie Ann at that time.

Eighteen years on from my own ordination, what reflections can I offer that aren't a simple set of clichés? I am aware that there are all sorts of practical things about doing the things that priests do, but that would be to miss the point. Let me instead offer the following reflections.

Priesthood is about the grace of God, not about how good we are at certain tasks. He it is that calls, sustains and equips, and he does it out of mercy, grace and love.

Like all God's people, living in the grace of God sets us free to be ourselves. We may model ourselves on others or hope that we won't be like some – but in the end it is “me” that God wants to be his servant.

It is a privilege and joy to celebrate communion and proclaim God's forgiveness and blessing. Every single time.

Apart from our responsibilities to God, people matter more than anything else. Getting the service right, having everything organised and seeing that everything runs smoothly may help – but the priority of people puts everything into perspective.

Priesthood is a demanding responsibility which may keep you awake at night or make you weary at times. That is why the bishop says to you just before you are ordained:

“Because you cannot bear the weight of this ministry in your own strength but only by the grace and power of God, pray earnestly for the Holy Spirit.”

He's right!

Julie Ann, the Benefice joins with me in praying that your ordination to the priesthood will bring you deep joy and a profound sense of knowing that you obey the God you love and serve.



MINI MAIZE GREENHOUSES

During April and into May, many fields have been sporting shiny plastic stripes. This material has revolutionised the growing of maize in the UK. Maize has many uses, but most people are only aware of its cousin sweet corn, which produces the succulent cobs enjoyed on our barbecues in the summer, and the cornflakes in our breakfast bowls.

Farmers have been growing maize as a crop for making whole crop silage for some years. The resulting feed is highly nutritious, producing good beef cattle and milk from dairy cows. The biggest problem with growing maize in the UK is that the seeds require warm soil to germinate well; they hate the cold and wet. In a cold wet spring, some of the seeds may rot resulting in a poor yield per hectare. Maize requires a long growing season to allow the cobs to ripen and harden, so a good early start is favourable.



This is where the plastic stripes come in. Contractors arrive with their specialist machinery and drill the seeds into the soil. The contractor also covers the seeds with the protective plastic and the edges of the plastic are secured by covering them with soil. The strips keep the seeds warm and speeds up germination. By the end of May, the young maize plants start to push the plastic aside and grow away strongly.

When I first saw these plastic strips, I was concerned as to what happened to them after they had done their job. Traditional plastics are bad for the environment as they do not biodegrade and are hazardous to wildlife and domestic animals, as well as being very unsightly. What were farmers doing polluting their fields with plastic? After making a few enquiries, I discovered to my

relief that this type of plastic is made from wheat and it readily biodegrades back into the soil, leaving no trace that it was ever there.

The maize grows strongly through the summer, and by September it will be more than 1.5 metres tall. Once the cobs have ripened and hardened, the contractor returns, and the crop is harvested, chopped and piled in a roofless three sided building called a clamp. It is rolled to exclude air and sealed over the top with black plastic in the same way that grass silage is made. With the gathering

interest in bio fuels, and oil for industry, a new market is opening up for farmers. Maize oil and rape seed oil are now both in increasing demand to fill these new markets. So it is likely that we shall see more maize grown and an increase in the bright yellow rape fields in spring.

Team Diseworth

There has been much water through the Brook since the last 'Rally Report' from Team Diseworth, mainly because our technical author (he of quick wit and tall stories, one Steve Peake) has spent much time working down 'in the smoke' and has not been around to recount the war stories - in his own inimitable fashion. However until he's back, the woods are obviously safe but I'm not so sure about the skies.

Anyway, 2006 saw Jim Snee and Chris Draycott both finishing the East Midlands Drivers Championship on the podium, in 2nd and 3rd places respectively, whilst Team Diseworth filled all 3 podium places in the co-driver section with Steve Peake taking the top spot followed by Tracy Wood and John Pickavance. Jim also managed to take the class win in the North East Midlands championship. So, not too bad a year for us country cousins from Paraffin City (as Diseworth was formally affectionately known).

Winter activities required an engine rebuild for Chris and a gearbox rebuild for



Jim. Both were accomplished in time for the first planned event - the Robin Hood Stages - scheduled for mid March and both cars were entered. There was also much banter between both drivers as to who would come out on top. Both were to be thwarted.

The first to fail was Jim. Senior Management reminded him (a mere week before the rally) that he was already committed to a long standing social occasion. The old 'I forgot' excuse cut no ice with her and he had to withdraw in order to save his manhood, his marriage and her sanity. Chris fared much better. He and Steve made the event, passed scrutineering and spent the early part of the Sunday morning strutting around dressed up as rally drivers with a rally car - they really looked good. They even managed to drive off the start line. Then the car stopped, before they'd even reached the first stage. And it wouldn't start again. An electrical widget (ECU if you're technical) had gone on strike. And they didn't have a spare - Jim did, but his car was back in Diseworth. And that was that. All that effort and they might just as well have stayed in bed. Still, they very much enjoyed the posing, and the waving to all the other

rally cars who drove past them - sympathetically.

Actually, it was a real shame for them as (if I say so myself) there is little doubt that they'd have trounced the opposition – but don't tell Chris I said that, he's such a modest chap and I'd hate that sort of comment to go to his head.

Next up was the Twyford Stages on Easter Sunday. Jim was the only Team Diseworth player out on this event as Chris had elected to come along to do some 'spannering' in case Jim had any problems with his car. Tim Oxborough (who usually forms part of the service crew) was the 'guest' co-driver for the day.

Twyford is a disused Second World War airfield where the concrete roads and runways are still largely intact. It now belongs to the Forestry Commission which means that the bits that should be grass are trees instead. This makes it very fast but very lacking in escape routes for the unwary. So it tends to sort the men out from the boys. It also means that if you make a mistake you're likely to damage the car, especially tyres and suspension.

We reckoned there were 2 other cars in our class to look out for, both Vauxhalls. Andy (in a Nova) who is a quick driver with a very lightweight and powerful car and another Kevin (in an Astra) who is also quite handy but his car is less powerful.

After the 1st stage Andy was 2 seconds up on us but Kevin had collected a puncture and that was him out of

contention. Andy was going well (too well!) and took a further 7 seconds out of us on the 2nd stage but his hard charging antics broke his car on the next stage and he too dropped out of contention with a broken driveshaft. This left us in the clear and all we had to do was finish the event to win the class – which we did but it wasn't all plain sailing. On the next stage we had a problem and got stuck in 1st gear which allowed the other two to claw back some of the gap.

Chris worked a minor miracle to fix the car for us in the service break but we had to then tram on a bit to hold station. So I made a mistake. It didn't really cost us much time but it put a mighty great hole in the radiator and rearranged the front of the car a bit. And the engine got a bit hot too. Again, Chris and the boys sorted the job at the service halt.

Andy now smelled blood so he went for gold, broke his suspension and went home. We completed the event with no more drama and held on to the class win. So that was good, except that the car fell off the trailer when we were loading up to come home which did it a power of additional no good. Still, we didn't damage the trailer which has to be a win!

We have another 'racer' in the village, one Tracy Morris, who does the roundy roundy stuff on the race circuits. I went to watch him in action at Donington a week or two ago and it all looked very impressive. We ought to have some reports from his camp to keep us in the loop. On his NATS Award for Excellence in Air Traffic Management



Jim Snee, pilot and Air Traffic Manager, for **bmi**, was surprised and delighted to receive the news that he had been given the only **NATS** (National Air Traffic Services) **External Award for outstanding achievement**.

The presentation took place on May 3rd at the Grosvenor House Hotel, Park Lane, London at a 'black tie' Dinner in the Ballroom, for approximately 400 people.

Jim and his wife Carly had a wonderful time enjoying the comforts of the Grosvenor Hotel. They were joined by three of their sons who work close by and the family shared a happy afternoon before the big event.

A Champagne Reception preceded the dinner and Awards ceremony where Jim was warmly congratulated by many people involved in different areas of the airline industry.

The Presentation Ceremony, the first of its kind, was reminiscent of the 'Oscars' with 3 nominations in each category and the winner being announced after the opening of a large silver envelope to a fanfare of music! There were 5 Internal Awards given to 4 teams of people and 1 individual and Jim received the only external award. The judges were Paul Barron CBE, The Rt. Hon Baroness Dean of Thornton-le Fylde, Steve Ridgeway, Chief Executive of Virgin Atlantic Airways and Cathy Powell, Director of Baxter Neumann.

Paul Barron, CEO of National Air Traffic Services and the Chairman of the judging panel said: 'The Awards ceremony itself has been the culmination of a lot of hard work by a lot of people. It is a fitting occasion to recognise the outstanding achievement of those who have won an award and of those that were finalists or were highly commended. The fact that these nominations have been made by colleagues in the business gives them even more credibility. I know the judges found it extremely hard to decide on the winners because the standard was so high. This reflects on the quality of people we have at NATS. Many congratulations to all who have been recognised.'

Chairman's Report, 2006-07

This has been a year of both consolidation and innovation. We have tried to represent the views of the parish in our responses to local, regional and national initiatives, though very often it is difficult to publicise complex documents in a way which encourages responses. We have responded to initiatives from the airport, and continued to object to night flying, and also to training flights. On this latter issue, we are pleased to report that not only are training flights at weekends to be further restricted, but also that training flights by those airlines which are not commercial users of the airport will not be allowed – this bars for example Virgin who have been regular and unwelcome trainers.

We would like to draw attention to the initiatives taken by the Council over the last twelve months or so. The major gain has been the start of a series of traffic initiatives. Speed lights have already been installed along the Green in Diseworth, and observation suggests they have had a marked affect. Plans are advanced for the installation of traffic lights at Hathern Turn – the junction of the A6 with the B5324; and further traffic control measures along the B5324 from Hathern turn through to Osgathorpe have been approved and will be implemented in stages.

The Parish Council has applied to be managers of the Speedwatch Scheme through the two villages. This requires 200 sponsors – residents indicating their support for the scheme – along with between six and twelve volunteers to operate it. Unfortunately we still require thirty sponsors, and at least one more volunteer before we can be considered; in particular we have only one volunteer from Long Whatton, who are normally the most vociferous about traffic speeding. Please sign up!

Travellers in Diseworth – at the top of Hyams lane – have been a cause of concern for some time. While some have moved on, there continues to be a number on County Council Land, and we are continuing to press for further action.

We have continued to support a number of village organisations. The two Parish Churches, and their clocks (of course), and various parcels of land which need maintenance, such as Diseworth Village Hall Field. The playgrounds are also our

responsibility, and are kept safe, although damage to the Diseworth Play area continues to be source for concern. If the problem is caused by local young people, we hope it will be addressed by the Big Lottery Grant we have obtained to build a Youth Shelter in the grounds of the Village Hall. Work will start this summer, in consultation with a Youth Forum, a group of young people drawn together by the Parish Plan steering group.

The Parish Plan group have already presented some interim findings, and their action plan will be presented soon. The Parish Council have supported their work throughout, and will continue to support their recommendations as far as is possible. A very special thanks to all who came to the many Parish Plan meetings and those who volunteered to distribute the questionnaires personally around the two villages. This was a mammoth task and is much appreciated. A group from the team came to the Council meeting and gave important accounts of their findings.

We have supported the routine maintenance of the Millennium Meadow, but in addition have provided improved signage, and with the help of the Parish Tree Warden, obtained a tree from the International Tree Foundation to help publicise their work around the world. This was an unusual and special accolade for the Meadow and the Parish.

Planning is of course the major part of our work, and our Planning Committee, chaired by Mary Hobbs, meets once or twice a month as required. There have been no major problems this year, although the lack of progress on several sites is a cause of considerable concern, particularly where the appearance of the villages is adversely affected.

A small but welcome improvement was the resurfacing of the bus stop waiting area at Town End in Diseworth – the Council followed up complaints from residents and the response from County Highways was commendably prompt.

We have said goodbye to our Clerk of over seven years, Nev Cheetham, who sadly had to retire through ill health. A small presentation was made to him at the Bull and Swan, and he will be remembered with affection by many of us for his involvement in many village events, not least leading his band in true New Orleans marching band style at the Diseworth Jubilee Street Party. His temporary replacement, Lindsay Swinfield, has also moved on to Quorn, a much larger Council, and we are as I write about to interview for a permanent replacement.

My thanks to all who have provided help and support during the year – the two clerks, my fellow councillors, and all who have supported our work in different ways. Two of our councillors resigned at the election – Mary Hobbs and Vicky Collins – so our special thanks to them.

Tips and Reminders

ICE (In Case of Emergency)

Research carried out by Vodafone showed that more than 75 per cent of people carry no details of who they would like to be contacted following a serious accident or illness. In conjunction with the East Anglian Ambulance NHS Trust they developed ICE. The scheme encourages people to store the details of the person they would like contacted in an emergency in their mobile phone's phonebook using the word ICE in front of the person's name. This makes it much easier for the emergency services to identify quickly who they should be calling. Several numbers can be stored using ICE1, ICE2, etc. The person whose number is being used should have agreed to be the ICE contact and should know about any medical conditions that could affect emergency treatment.

People under 18 should have an ICE contact who is a parent or guardian authorised to make decisions on their behalf. Friends and other relatives cannot make decisions on behalf of a person admitted to hospital.



BALANCING OUR BLOOD SUGAR

Maintaining a steady level of sugar in our blood is one of the most important factors in maintaining our physical, emotional and mental health. Consuming the right foods and beverages is crucial to stabilizing our blood sugar. Glucose is the only fuel that the body can use as energy. After we have consumed some food or drink, it is digested and the resulting glucose is absorbed through the walls of the intestine and passes into the bloodstream. This raises the level of sugar in the blood, so the pancreas produces insulin to lower the level back to normal. Some of the glucose is used by the body as energy, and any excess glucose is changed into glycogen and stored in the muscles and liver until required.

A diet high in sugar and refined carbohydrates causes a see-sawing of blood sugar levels. As the blood sugar plummets, the adrenal glands produce adrenaline, a stress hormone, and the pancreas produces glucagon which causes the liver to release some of its glycogen stores back into glucose. If the blood sugar remains low for a long time, unpleasant symptoms occur such as irritability, aggressive outbursts, irregular or fast heartbeats, lack of libido and sweating. There may also be acute cravings for sugary foods and drinks. If we give in to the cravings and consume the sweet food or drink, we then get a sugar high which in the short term makes us feel better, but then we quite quickly experience a sugar low and the cravings return.

The way to stop this happening is to reduce or cut out refined carbohydrates such as white flour in white bread, cakes, biscuits and pastries, also sugar and foods containing sugar such as chocolate, sweets, biscuits, soft drinks and squashes. Convenience foods are very likely to contain refined carbohydrates so are best avoided. Tea and coffee, even if decaffeinated, contain other stimulants which disrupt blood sugar levels, as does smoking and alcohol. Include complex



carbohydrates in the diet such as wholewheat bread, wholewheat pasta, new potatoes, brown rice, millet, oats and rye. Vegetables, whole grains, and all types of beans, fresh, canned or dried are excellent. Eat fruits and drink diluted pure fruit juice or fruit based drinks such as Aqua Libra, Ame or Appletise. Fruit or herb teas and the South African red bush tea can be drunk freely as they do not contain caffeine.

Eating a small amount of complex carbohydrate every three hours is helpful, it doesn't have to be much, and a dry whole-wheat cracker between main meals is fine and is especially recommended at bed time if there is a tendency to wake in the night. There is of course little harm in having the occasional indulgence from time to time as long as the basic diet is good. In fact, having the indulgent snack or drink at the end of a meal probably doesn't do much harm in the long run.

The 'Hospital Bug'

There has been much concern recently about visiting patients in hospital who have contracted what is often called the 'hospital bug' or C. diff. NHS Direct has produced some guidelines for visitors which explains the precautions.

Clostridium Difficile

Prevention

Unfortunately, C. difficile (C. diff) bacteria can spread easily, particularly in healthcare environments. However, a number of precautions can be taken to reduce the risk of infection.

Advice for visitors

If you are visiting a person in a healthcare environment who has diarrhoea or a stomach upset, try to avoid taking any children under the age of 12 with you. You should also:

- wash your hands with soap and water when entering and leaving ward areas and, in addition to using soap and water, you should also use an alcohol hand gel, if available,
- avoid healthcare environments if you are feeling unwell or have recently had diarrhoea,
- avoid sitting on beds, and
- observe visiting hours and guidelines.
