



## Living with Joy – Dance of Delight

Whilst away on retreat in the autumn, God spoke to me about delighting in him. Today, a crisp winter's day, I want to share with you some of my thoughts to inspire you through these winter months.

Our multiple commitments often find us intensely engaged in the tasks of the church and the tasks of life. With focused integrity, we become the helpers, holders and healers of the world.

God, however, looks on and longs to place a tender hand on our cheek and say: "Thank you for being so organised and efficient: Thank you for your energy, dedication and enthusiasm."  
"Now, my love, give it a rest and lighten up!"

For me, and I suspect for many, our greatest challenge in faith is to laugh and enjoy life (especially God). Let's escape our false image of God as severe, judging and retributive. Instead, dare to believe that we are made to mirror a joyous God who delights in laughter, beauty and pleasure. This our creator and companion calls us to balance the reality of our pain with the generously provided gifts of pleasure. Isn't it amazing how some of the most persecuted, in the most deprived parts of the world, bubble over with God-given joy? Just as Paul did in prison.

The intensity with which we live in the world is often matched by the intensity we bring to our life with God. If we are not careful, we find our prayer life becomes a task to be completed rather than an enjoyment to be savoured. So easily, then, the obligations of religion step in and become life-sapping rather than life-giving. In our public as well as our private worship, let's go for authenticity that touches the integrity of the God of light and joy.

This desire for delight and joy cuts deep into our restless, driven lives. God's invitation to delight in him is by no means an invitation to construct false fronts of denial or patterns of pretending, but rather to develop a discipline of balance. We are invited to lighten our spirits as we relax into the arms of the God of Joy, knowing that even amid our struggle we are given a heart that was created to dance. And the eternal rhythm of the dance is joy.



## FOUR COCKERELS AND A HEN BIRD

*3 of the cockerels at Ladygate Farm*

In January, my three hens decided spring had arrived, and started laying eggs again. This meant it was time to move our electrified fox proof netting wire, and use it to fence off a different section of the vegetable garden. We move it every year to give some of the land a break, and grow vegetables on the rest. The hens can roam about within the electrified netting, scratching

about uprooting weeds, eating pests and adding a little manure as they go.

This year things are slightly more complicated, as we were given five baby bantams in the autumn. They all looked as if they could be hen birds, but it is very hard to tell when they are so young. Anyway, we put them into a large henhouse for the winter,

and waited to see how many of them turned out to be hens. As they grew, it became obvious that two of them were definitely cockerels. Well, three hens out of five is not bad, so I kept feeding them and pondering on what to do with the cockerels. Unfortunately, after another week or so, it was obvious that two more of them were cockerels. Well, the last one was definitely a hen bird, so it wasn't a complete disaster, but disappointing just the same. I could keep one cockerel and the single hen bantam in the electrified run, but what to do with the other three? We could sell them in Melton Mowbray or fatten them up for the freezer. I had become quite fond of them as they are quite pretty, lovely bronze necks and backs, blue and black bodies and tail feathers and red combs and wattles so I didn't really fancy eating them. Then I had a

brainwave. We could swap them around so that three of the cockerels could live in the ark, and be moved about the vegetable garden, the remaining cockerel could stay with the hen bantam and be joined by the three laying hens and be let out into the electrified run.

When it was dark, we did the swap. From the noise they all made, you would think they were being murdered! The next morning, I let the cockerels into the outside run of the ark, and the hens and the two bantams out into the electrified run. Well they all seemed happy with their new homes, and were soon scratching about in the sunshine. Each day I shall move the ark to allow the cockerels to scratch up another bit of vegetable garden. So they have been saved from the pot, and I have been saved some weeding.

*Over the winter months the Snailhunter has had a lovely rest and at Christmas indulged herself with plenty of food, chocs and the odd tippie or three (hic). It was purely to build up her health and strength for the coming summer!!*

*Whilst her enemies have been in hibernation she has devised a new tactic to outwit them after last years 'windy' episode with the melons. She will let you know how she gets on when the snails and slugs reappear. She does have one problem though – by denying them the melons – will she be guilty of cruelty and neglect?*

We now have an alternative version. 'To fool one Sue at any time is pretty good, to fool two Sue's at the same time, is pretty damned excellent'!

Even better was the fact that it was entirely unplanned, a completely spontaneous bit of Sue-foolery and utter silliness by grown women, which has yet to be rivalled.

A number of female friends from the village took a short break at Centre-Parcs some time ago, sharing neighbouring chalets on the edge of the lake.

As always, there was much laughter and joking during the weekend, much of it targeted at one poor unfortunate who happened to be wheelchair bound at the time. concerned about the people already relaxing in the dark sensory room, who were inadvertently woman-handled by some of our group on their way in.

Later, in the pool we spent an energetic evening sliding and sprawling down the rapids and along the chutes, surfacing in a jumble of legs and arms. One of our group slid and sprawled a bit too effectively, but failed to surface. We watched the swirl of water into which she had plunged, and waited and waited for her to pop up. Suddenly she was spotted in a whirlpool area and a Sue hauled her up to the top.

We can tell you that experiencing one barely clad Sue charging across the room is bad enough, but to endure two scantily clothed Sues storming in, intent on mischief is one experience too many. Lesser people would have been permanently traumatised.

So, a little subdued because we hadn't reacted as expected, they messed up our beds a bit more and wandered off back to their room.

that led along to their bedroom. We whispered our plan to each other and then stood in silence, one either side of their door.





How can councils justify this new regime of emptying dustbins every fortnight? # HEALTH PAGE

## Muscle Spasms and Cramps


Exercising too hard, overdoing the gardening, too long on the computer. Maybe you have an old injury that flares up from time to time. All these situations can cause muscle spasms and cramps. The muscle will constrict into a tight painful mass in an attempt to prevent further injury.



Fortunately, there are some simple ways to find relief. If you get a sudden cramp, find the centre of the muscle and apply enough pressure with your loosely clenched fist, heel of your hand or your thumb that causes some pain, but not too much. Hold the pressure for 8 to 12 seconds and the cramp will often disappear using nothing more than this simple exercise. If you have a cramp in your back or buttock, lay a tennis ball on the floor and cover it with a towel. Lie down on top of the ball, and move around until you can isolate it under the painful spot. Relax and let the ball sink into the muscle, then just lie there and wait for the cramp to ease. If the cramp is very persistent, put an ice pack on it to calm the nerves. Wrap the ice pack in a towel and apply to the area for up to twenty minutes.

Sometimes spasms and cramps that occur at night can be caused by a deficiency of magnesium in the diet. Good sources of magnesium can be found in brown rice, beans, peas, nuts, brewers yeast, whole grains and bitter chocolate. Low levels of the mineral, potassium can also cause cramps. Good sources are avocados, leafy green vegetables, bananas, dried fruits, potatoes, melon and soy flour. Most cramps are usually only annoying, but if a cramp or spasm persists for more than a few days, or there is swelling, bruising or bleeding around the area, see your doctor.

Calf cramps while walking can be a sign of circulatory trouble in the legs. Consult your doctor for treatment. If you have persistent cramps that are not caused by a medical condition, massage can be very effective at relieving the chronic tension in the muscle that is causing the problem.

We have had an eventful half term at school. Everyone had a lovely

Then the dreaded flu bug struck, gradually at first with just a couple of children being off school but eventually with only 23 children left in school and members of staff off sick, Dr Philip Monk, Consultant in Communicable Disease Control from the Health Protection Agency in the East Midlands South Region advised us that school should close for at least 3 days. A big thank you to all those parents who had to find child care for last Friday at short notice. The good news is that most children are beginning to return to school over this week and hopefully after half term everyone should be back to their normal healthy selves!

We are holding a maths information evening on Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> February. The way that maths is taught in school has changed and is continuing to change which means that lots of parents feel they are unable to help their children at home. There will be opportunities to find out about some of the different strategies that we teach children to help them with calculation. Hopefully we will be able to give maths a more positive profile with parents, many parents did not have good experiences of maths teaching mainly at secondary school

and this can have a very big impact on their child's confidence. Each family will be given a maths information pack to take home at the end of the evening which will give opportunities to practice and develop skills at home. Hopefully lots of families will attend – refreshments are part of the evening! We will be offering more information evenings after Easter.

Despite the flu the children have all been working hard.

**Class 1** have been working on a Bear topic based around George Bear who lives in class 1. He likes to spend weekends and holidays with the children and has been to some very interesting places. Staff in school never mention in George's hearing where they are thinking of going on holiday otherwise he ends up coming with you! He spent a few days in Las Vegas and arrived back with his holiday photos. He has been skiing in Switzerland and at present he is somewhere near the Cook I slands diving with Mrs Roberts. A talk on the Black Death by Pat Guy made a very interesting subject for the February meeting of the Women's Group.

The possible role of rats in the spread of Black Death has also been questioned in the light of new evidence on their historical distribution.

The talk ended with thoughts on the parallels to be drawn with the reactions to outbreaks of dangerous diseases today – SARS, Bird Flu etc. and what might happen if a modern version of the Black Death (which had disappeared by the 1700's) were to reappear.

Holding our breath and our laughter we slid under the bed, waited and listened. We heard the two Sues roaring and hollering as they banged our bedroom door wide open.


We could picture them leaping into the room like a pair of demented Ninjas, then a long silence followed as they found our beds and room empty.
