

Notes from the Belton Rectory May 2008


Appointment of team rector

I am very happy to announce the appointment of the new team rector to the Kegworth & Hathern Team Ministry. Revd. Gill Turner-Callis will be commencing in this post in September. At present she is completing her curacy in the parish of Shepshed and Oaks in Charnwood. Gill will be covering for the area dean's sabbatical (May to July). She has a holiday booked during August and a commitment to a kids club in September.

Gill has a BA in Divinity and worked as a youth/student leader before training for the ministry at Wycliffe Hall. She was ordained in 2005. She has already taken services in our Benefice over the last three years and is known to the clergy. I will invite her to write about herself in a future edition.

For the time being life in the Benefice will continue as normal. We will be building on all the hard work that many have done over the last two years to support the church. The next few months are an ideal opportunity to strengthen the life of the individual churches.

We have no date as yet for an induction service for Gill, but this will be announced in due course.



A DOZEN LITTLE EGG LAYERS



The last few weeks we have spent constructing a new pen for our young hens. To be fair Will has done all of the building of it and I have been doing things like fetching the wood and netting from round the farm and then creosoting all the woods, which is very messy, not my favourite job by a long way.

The chickens arrived back in February before the pen was even started but we had already cleaned out the old hen house, fixed the door and checked that it was fox proof. The dozen pullets were released inside their new home. For the next few

weeks there they had to stay, shut in safely away from the fox. Unfortunately, this made it a bit of a nightmare to feed them.

Each morning I opened the entrance door with my bucket of corn in hand to be met with a swarm of enthusiastic hens all trying to escape out the door or jump in the bucket of food. I really needed three hands to fend them off and make it into the hen house to feed them. Gloves were essential as they pecked at my hands all the time I was trying to empty out the corn and check that they had enough water. I'm sure they

were not being malicious, just curious.

Eventually the pen was finished and the little bob hole could be opened. Out they came, all piling out like a feathery brown wave, excited to explore their new surroundings. Almost immediately they started scratching the soil looking for food. Hens will eat almost anything, seeds, insects, worms and all types of vegetation which gives the yokes a lovely golden colour.

I have really missed having some hens since the fox got into the old run and killed them all. We knew that there was no point in

having any more until we had a fox proof pen. Now every time they spot me, they all fly across in a cloud then run along the fence, falling over themselves to see what tasty titbits I might have for them. When I toss the food over the fence they grab it and run around chasing each other about and trying to snatch bits off each other. Food scraps that are not suitable for the compost bin and tough perennial weeds all get thrown into the pen to be pecked to bits.

Now we just need longer days and some sunshine and we shall soon have plenty of eggs.

Vandalism at the Baptist Chapel

We are very sorry to report that there has been an incident of vandalism in the village involving the Baptist Chapel in Lady Gate. Over the weekend of 5th and 6th April one of the stained glass windows in the front wall was broken in several places by, what seems to be, a football being kicked into it. This follows a similar incident a few months ago when one of the upstairs windows was also broken in the same way – the round hole being particularly obvious. However, in the case of the stained glass window, the damage is quite literally irreparable as the glass from which they are made is no longer available and so the whole window will have to be rebuilt at considerable cost. It is particularly regrettable that, having stood empty but untouched for 7 years, this damage should occur just as we are about to start the restoration work. Doubtless the culprits are unaware of the cost and seriousness of the damage they have caused but they do know that they were responsible and that to damage property in this way is wrong.

Work to start soon on restoring the Baptist Chapel

We are very pleased to report that we have now chosen a contractor to




carry out the restoration on the Chapel in Lady Gate. They are **Midland Stonemasonry** from Normanton on Soar, who are currently working on the church spire in Belton. They are planning to start work in mid May and the first task will be to remove the asbestos that lines the building. This will involve specialist contractors as the asbestos has to be removed with great care and all of the waste collected in sealed containers for safe disposal. This is likely to involve a number of vehicles being parked in the road outside the Chapel for up to two weeks whilst this work is carried out. We apologise in advance for any inconvenience but it is essential that this work is carried out in accordance with all of the safety regulations. Residents are also warned that during the restoration the site will be hazardous, especially to children and whilst it will be secure they should ensure the inquisitive youngsters are not tempted to trespass and be injured as a result. The external building and interior work are scheduled to take about 6 months after which time further fitting out will be needed prior to the building reopening some time in the late autumn. *Meg Galley*


Diseworth Millennium Meadow


On March 12th a couple of my students sat their piano exams, this time at Loughborough Emmanuel Church Centre. Both took their Grade 1 and passed with good marks.



LONG WHATTON & DISEWORTH PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



■ The threatening ash tree in Grimes Gate, Diseworth has gone. An excellent and efficient operation was carried out by the contractor and the Council's worry about the potential danger has disappeared with the tree.

■ A major topic arising from the Parish Plan was the need for affordable housing in both villages and – very swiftly – the Parish Council has taken up this important challenge by holding a meeting with the Rural Housing Enabler and a District Council Officer. In an intense discussion, the advantages of proceeding with the scheme were explained. This was likely to provide a very real benefit to a great many local people over the years to come. The way forward was explained in great detail and all of this was discussed at our Council meeting the following evening. Parish Councillors had no hesitation in accepting that this was potentially a Very Good Thing for the villages and agreed to immediately sign the Protocol which would ensure the progress of the survey which was essential to formally establish the need for affordable housing.

And the starting gun has already fired! The action will begin immediately with an article in this newsletter. Please do read it carefully. Everyone is asked to be involved when the questionnaire is delivered very soon.

Everyone's response is important. Many local people will benefit if there's a positive response. This is a really tangible and effective way in which everyone can participate in supporting their community. Just by ticking the boxes!

■ At another local meeting the Chairman, Martin Hening, had discussed with a Highways Officer the problem of "airport parking" in local streets. It's cheaper to park your car in Clements Gate or Hall Gate and elsewhere and catch the bus to the airport to fly off for your holiday in Majorca or wherever. It was agreed that various steps would be taken to mitigate this real nuisance to local people who are denied parking places for their own legitimate purposes.

■ Also agreed was a sign to Long Whatton Post Office and action on fly tipping on County Council owned land.

■ At most meetings it seems that some small jobs need doing on Parish Council property, such as a fence repair, minor play equipment maintenance, a notice fixing up and even litter clearance on a regular basis. In the past, reliance

has been placed on the goodwill of Councillors and others to do odd jobs like these. It was accepted that this was inadequate and enquiries are to be made to find a local person who would be able to take responsibility for these tasks on a regular basis.

■ The specialist firm which maintains the Long Whatton Church clock has told us there is a need for the clock face to be “refurbished”. This caused a few raised eyebrows and more enquiries will be made.

■ We’re still awaiting the installation of the youth shelter at Diseworth – any time now!

■ We are to respond to the offer of some grant funding to provide a bus shelter at Hathern Road, Long Whatton (at the bus layby near Turvey Lane). Some local funding would be needed and enquiries are to be made.

■ The meeting concluded with a discussion about the procedure which is used by the District Planners to decide potentially controversial planning applications. Questions will be asked at the forthcoming Area Community Forum.

Just a reminder – on 1st May at 7.15pm at Long Whatton Methodist Hall – will be your Annual Parish Meeting. This is the meeting at which every Elector of the Parish is an equal member and can raise issues, propose action and vote on anything of direct relevance to the Parish. More details about all this and more on the website longwhattondiseworth.org.uk and on the notice boards.

Response from PARISH PLAN ACTION PLAN

“We are driving young families away from our villages – there is no affordable accommodation for them” - Quote from Parish Plan Long Whatton & Diseworth 2008

Following the Parish plan, the Parish Council is becoming increasingly concerned that the community is being adversely affected by people having to move elsewhere to find a suitable home. Young and old alike may be forced to move away from their family and friends because rents and house prices have soared in rural areas making it impossible for them to stay; much as they might like to. This may result in schools

and other amenities having to close, worsening the situation. As was also highlighted in the Parish Plan, developers tend to build large family houses which may be unsuitable for those starting out in life or older residents looking for bungalows.

To address this problem planners are able to approve small developments on the edge of villages for affordable housing only, resulting in housing for those who cannot afford to access the open market from their own means. The properties fit well with their surroundings and remain for the use of people with a strong connection to the Parish. In planning jargon this is known as an “Exception” site.

These properties, usually a mixture of property types and sizes, may be rented or part purchased. The latter option gives younger villagers access to the housing ladder which may otherwise be closed to them. However, these properties cannot be completely owned and then sold off. When sold they are recycled for the use of villagers, in perpetuity.

There is a good example of this in action at Swannington, where a small development has been established on the edge of the village. The properties, finished in 2007, were built to a very high standard by a firm of local builders and the scheme has been welcomed by the community. Some of the homes are rented and the others are for shared ownership. These are managed by a local housing association.

To start a scheme in your community the first thing to organise is a survey to assess local housing needs in the village. This has been agreed by your Parish Council and takes the form of a questionnaire delivered to each household in the village and is conducted in partnership between the District Council, Parish Council and the Rural Housing Enabler. The costs of printing and postage are covered by the Enabler.

The results are then analysed by the Enabler and presented to the Parish Council in a form that is acceptable to local planning authorities. If a need for homes is shown then the search starts for a site.

If this is successful, and the usual planning permissions are granted, then it is subsequently developed by a housing association. They manage the properties on behalf of the village - liaising with the parish council to ensure that all important local connection of applicants.



HEALTH PAGE

HAIR, OUR CROWNING GLORY OR RAT'S NEST?



The condition of our hair can be a strong indicator of our general health. Almost any illness or emotional stress can cause our hair to become dull and lifeless. So the condition of our hair can act as an early warning sign that we are not well or maybe lacking in certain vitamins and minerals.

Healthy hair shines from a thin coating of sebum, an oily substance secreted by the scalp's sebaceous glands near the root of each hair. If the sebaceous glands are overactive and the hair becomes greasy, it may help to cut down on sugar in the diet. If the hair becomes dry and is affected by dandruff this may indicate a zinc deficiency. Foods rich in zinc include shellfish, red meat and pumpkin seeds.

Essential fatty acids also help to prevent dry and flaky skin so can be of great benefit if the hair and scalp become dry. Include plenty of cold pressed vegetable oils, nuts and oily fish such as sardines, mackerel and salmon in the diet. If dandruff and scalp problems persist, consult your doctor as they can sometimes indicate more serious underlying health problems.

Some hair loss is quite normal, healthy people shed about 100 hairs a day. Age related hair loss, especially in men, is largely genetic. Hair loss can be caused by a variety of other conditions such as pregnancy, anemia, circulatory problems, thyroid disorders and stress. People suffering from stress are often found to be deficient in all the B vitamins. Good sources include wholegrain cereals, oily fish, yeast extract, peas, natural yogurt, eggs and milk. A deficiency in vitamin A may also cause dull, lifeless hair. To correct the imbalance, include lots of dark leafy green vegetables, carrots, sweet potatoes and dried apricots, all of which contain beta carotene, which the body converts into vitamin A when required.

WOMENS' GROUP

The History Society joined with us to hear Wendy Eccles account of the Lancashire cotton trade. In the eighteenth century raw cotton arrived at the Manchester or Liverpool docks and was transported along the canal system and delivered to the workers cottages via the 'putters out' carrying the cotton bales on mules or packhorses. The whole family would be involved but it was the women who did the spinning, hence the name spinster.

In time, small sheds were erected to hold several looms. They were kept very damp as the cotton needed moisture. The Industrial Revolution had begun in 1780 and by 1800 there were 1200 looms.

Blackburn expanded quickly and people came to find work. The potato famine brought an influx of Irish people. They worked 12 to 18 hours a day. Robert Peel brought in a Health and Morals Act to protect workers and children.

The rivers became badly polluted with over-usage by the mills. The landowners became wealthy and William Fielden gave land for a hospital in the town centre. Another family, the Eccles, built a school to educate young adults and built cottages with gardens enabling healthier fresh vegetables to be grown.

The Hornby family paid £160,000 for the railway to be built, a stretch of 15 miles from Blackburn to Preston around 1907. Now of course most of the cotton trade has gone!



WIND TURBINES TAKE OFF AT EMA



East Midlands Airport has been granted permission by North West Leicestershire District Council to install four turbines on site. EMA will be the first UK airport to install four 31.5 metre wind turbines. The Airport has announced that the green energy makers will be up and running by late 2008. The four turbines are expected to produce up to 225kw each, which is enough to power 503 houses per annum and result in an estimated carbon saving of 850 tonnes per annum.

The location of each turbine has been carefully selected in order to ensure that the turbines are well screened with little impact on local residents. The four turbines will be located more than 800 metres from the closest property and will not be audible from any residential property.

The turbines, which will generate 10% of the Airport's energy, are an important step in

the Airport's commitment to make its ground operations carbon neutral by 2012. Over the last 10 years the Airport has invested more than £3 million in environmental initiatives and monitoring, from emission control to waste management and surface water management. In 2007 the Airport demonstrated its commitment to green energy by extending the departure lounge with a new green pier costing £6 million. The energy efficient pier obtains heat from 27 boreholes, each 100 metres deep, this is five times more efficient than other heating sources. In addition the toilets use rain water for flushing and all lighting is natural or low energy, reducing the impact on the environment.
