

*Dear Friends,*

During our Lent course this year, we had cause to think about Saints, and so I thought I'd spend a while thinking about the Saints that the church celebrate over the next couple of months.

The first that caught my eye was Julian of Norwich (c1300's), whose life we celebrate on 8<sup>th</sup> May. A hermit living next to the Church of St Julian in Norwich, little is known about her (even her name is derived from where she lived!). However we do know that she had a series of visions about God which enabled millions of Christians to see God as a loving mother as well as father, and also gave them hope in the oft quoted phrase "...All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well". This phrase is one of my favourites, reminding us that our plans, ways and timings are not God's – and even in the midst of tragedy, all will eventually be well.

The second saint I have cause to bring to your attention is one who has a real fascination for one of my parishioners, and I said that I would find out more about him for her – and so also for you! St Anthony of Padua or Lisbon is said to have lived in the 1100's, and is widely regarded as the patron saint of lost things. Quite why that is so is unclear, as if anything, he ought to be the saint of preaching as, when finding that a visiting group of Monks were expecting a sermon from someone in the community to which Anthony belonged, his Abbot decided Anthony should be the man! And with no time to prepare, he amazed his listeners with his eloquence and depth of understanding – something I would love to aspire to but sadly all too often fail at! However, one source seems to put his unlikely patronage down to a particular incident:

The reason for invoking St. Anthony's help in finding lost or stolen things is traced back to an incident in his own life. As the story goes, Anthony had a book of psalms that was very important to him. Besides the value of any book before the invention of printing, the Psalter had the notes and comments he had made to use in teaching students in his Franciscan Order.

A novice who had already grown tired of living religious life decided to depart the community. Besides going AWOL he also took Anthony's Psalter! Upon realizing



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## LIVING UNDER THE SHADOW OF BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS

For the last year we have been living with the possibility that some of our cattle may have bovine tuberculosis.

In May 2008 we had a routine test to screen all our cattle for bovine TB. When the results were checked, we were told by the vet that 3 animals had reacted positively to the skin test. This was a devastating blow for us, as it meant we were immediately placed under restrictions that prevented us from buying or selling any cattle. It was a very difficult time for us, as effectively the farm had no prospect of income until corn harvest in August 2008.



More tests were carried out during the summer to confirm that the three cattle, which were all cows, were definitely reactors, and then these affected animals were taken away and destroyed. Their lungs were examined for TB lesions, and none were found, so tissue samples were taken to the laboratory to see if cultures could be grown, proving that one or all of the animals had TB. All results came back negative much to our relief.

In the meantime, all our cattle had to be tested every 60 days, and fortunately some restrictions were removed and we could buy and sell under a license issued from the Animal Health Department.

Now, finally in March this year, we have had a full herd test that has shown only 3 inconclusive reactors, which should mean a lifting of most of our restrictions with only the 3 affected animals being tested sometime in May.

So why have we suddenly developed a problem with TB in our herd when we have never had any problems with it before. No one is really sure but history gives us some strong clues. Back in the

1940s as many as 40% of cattle herds had TB. After the war, widespread testing of all cattle was carried out. All infected cattle were culled and as herds became clear of TB they were given TT accredited status. At the same time, badger latrines were also tested for TB, and those badger setts also found to be infected with TB were culled by gassing all the badgers in those setts. Over time, there was a dramatic decline in TB in cattle, so that by 1981, less than 0.1% of herds were found to have TB, with only 500 cattle being culled as reactors a year, a considerable achievement.

In 1987 a new strategy was implemented that was less rigorous which meant that infected setts were only taken out on the farms where reactors were found. Infected setts were left alone on neighbouring farms.

During the ten years from 1987 until 1997, incidence of TB in cattle rose steadily. Then from 1997 until the present day, controls have been based solely on destroying reactors in cattle, implementing movement restrictions and leaving the badgers alone. As a result, there has been a massive increase in incidence of TB and 40,000 cattle are now being culled each year. Farmers are not anti badger, but history seems to show that to keep TB in cattle under control, infected badger setts must also be culled.

What we want is healthy cattle and healthy badgers, but if the powers that be do not act soon, we shall not only have a lot more cattle reactors in the national herd, but an awful lot of sick and dying badgers in our countryside also.



“Perhaps I can help,” he said.


It is truly amazing what he can do. He is exactly like the man on the television.





# HEALTH PAGE

## Eat to Ease Backache

Back pain has many causes including damage to discs, pressure on nerves, misalignment or inflammation of joints, damaged ligaments and diseased vertebrae. These can be a result of bad posture, a worn out mattress, sport injury, lifting incorrectly or from other disease in the body.

Medication can help, as can physiotherapy and adopting good lifting practice, and the treatment of any underlying disease. Although there are no nutritional cures as such, diet can help the body recover and is important in the prevention of back injury by keeping the bones and muscles strong.

Protein helps to build up the strong muscle tissue that supports the spine, so select from lean meat, beans, pulses, nuts and dairy products. All the B vitamins, especially niacin, strengthen and support the nervous system. Liver, oily fish such as mackerel, sardines and salmon are good sources of niacin and also vitamin D which aids the body's absorption of calcium, and is important in developing and maintaining healthy bones and nerves. A twice weekly serving of 100g of oily fish will provide the recommended amounts of these nutrients, while the fatty acids can help the body to suppress inflammation and reduce pain in the joints. Vitamin C is essential for the development and maintenance of strong bones. Most fresh fruit and vegetables are good sources of vitamin C.

If you are suffering from backache, it is wise to cut down on all drinks containing caffeine such as strong tea, coffee and cola. Caffeine is a stimulant and has the effect of narrowing blood vessels. This reduces the flow of blood to the affected area and so restricts the supply of nutrients, which may slow down the healing process, instead, drink plenty of water.

Finally, joints need to be kept moving to remain healthy. So to help prevent back pain, it is important to keep moving and take appropriate exercise, depending on age and fitness.

# LONG WHATTON & DISEWORTH PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



The Council held its April meeting at the newly opened Diseworth Heritage Centre and were interested to see the transformation of the building and the facilities available.

In Open Forum, Councillors were made aware of the potential flood risk of the Diseworth Brook due to the branch of a tree and various rubbish impeding its flow. In view of the major problems caused by flooding in the past, the Council would pursue this matter.

A number of residents present told the Council of their objections to the planning application to provide additional guest house accommodation at 47 The Green, Diseworth. These were taken into account later when the Council decided its response. (The Council's minutes, with its decisions, can always be seen at the website [www.longwhattondiseworth.org.uk](http://www.longwhattondiseworth.org.uk) from about a week prior to the next meeting).

At the formal meeting a proposal to fund an accessible computer at the Heritage Centre was considered and it was agreed to make a contribution. Work on affordable housing was proceeding, with the open meeting at Long Whatton scheduled for 7<sup>th</sup> May. The Chairman said he would convene a meeting of the 'airport parking' group of Diseworth residents.

A helpful response had been received from the area Highway Manager about a proposal for a footpath to the Millennium Meadow. This would be an expensive project requiring at least part-funding by the Parish and so will have to be considered in a future budget process.

Councillors are dismayed at the repeated failure of the contractor to carry out maintenance work on the play equipment. Alternative arrangements are to be made. Fortunately there are no major safety issues. The issue of "cycle racing" through Long Whatton continues to worry the Council - there must surely be a means of curbing this danger? The Clerk will pursue the question. There is a request by the District Council that a volunteer Community Warden to liaise and alert on flood prevention issues be appointed for this relatively high risk area. **Would someone in each village please volunteer for this interesting and potentially important role? - please contact the Parish Clerk.**

The Council has been consulted on draft traffic management and site management plans for the 2010 Formula 1 Grand Prix at Donington Park. Concerns at the lack of interest by the management in the effect on legitimate local traffic going about its everyday business will be expressed. Councillors will consider the question of the venues for future meetings of the Council next time.
