




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## THE WILD WHITE CATTLE OF CHILLINGHAM

Journeying back from holiday in Scotland, we dropped in to see a group of cattle thought to be the rarest in the world, The Wild White Cattle of Chillingham. They are the only cattle in the world to have remained free from any human interference for 700 years, and are closest to their wild prehistoric ancestors.

After a twenty minute walk we met the warden who took us to see the cattle. We were surprised at how close we were allowed to get to them as on the way down from Scotland, we discussed this and assumed that we would have to look at them over a fence, possibly through binoculars. But no, after instructions from the warden that we must do as he said to ensure safety, we were led quietly into the field where the wild cattle were grazing. We walked slowly to a point where we were about 100 metres from the cattle and he then instructed us to stop and stand quietly.

A few of the cattle stirred, stood up and stretched. The warden told us that the cattle were used to seeing people from a distance but were extremely dangerous if threatened, and would attack any human that got too close. Then as we watched the animals gently grazing and

socializing the warden told us some facts about these amazing animals. Cattle are exempt from having to be tagged as any human contact with individual animals result in the animal being killed by the rest of the herd when it is returned. Old animals that die are buried in a pit in the park, and any severely injured animals from fights that have broken legs or have other injuries that would cause suffering and a slow death are shot by

marksman, this though is a very rare occurrence.

DNA samples have been prepared from dead animals over the years which have shown that the Wild Cattle are a natural clone. All the cattle are genetically identical due to their very long history of inbreeding. Nowhere on earth are there any mammals more inbred than these cattle, yet they continue to survive and thrive. It is presumed that all harmful genes have been bred out by natural selection. In fact when autopsies are carried out on cattle that die of old age the animals, are mostly free from the usual diseases that plague commercial cattle. The only assistance they receive is hay, fed to them during the winter which is necessary as they are restricted to the 134 hectares of Chillingham

Park so can't roam to find new feeding grounds.

So as we crept away quietly from the Wild Cattle of Chillingham, I looked back on the peaceful scene of cows, calves and bulls all living naturally together and pondered on the privilege of having been so close to some of the rarest mammals on the planet.

The Millennium Meadow is available for use by all inhabitants of Diseworth and Long Whotton at any time. It is the perfect place for a quiet stroll, especially in an evening or very early in the morning. Hopefully, the grass will have been cut by the time you read this. All the trees are thriving and some are now quite an impressive size. Most of the special plants we introduced have settled in well and are beginning to spread and produce really good displays of flowers.

If you plan to have a picnic there, please do. Just let us know in advance if a large gathering is planned. Dogs are welcome in the Meadow provided they are under control and not allowed to foul the site. The small gate is always unlocked. Please ensure it is secured when you leave.



# *The Ploughworthians*

# Diseworth Annual Flower Show 2010

## *Many thanks to Pat Guy.*

Diseworth Flower Show has a long history going back over 50 years. The Show was revived by the Dialogue Committee in 1996 and the following year a small team including Pat Guy took it over. Pat, who announced her retirement this year has run the Show ever since. It is arguably the one event which brings together all residents of Diseworth and over the years has attracted a considerable number of visitors from neighbouring villages.

It is to Pat's credit that she has improved the Show over the years with many more classes of entry than 12 years ago and with an increased number of trophies and outside activities.

Each year as early as March, Pat has prepared the schedule and in consultation with a small group of helpers has designed the programme, changing the themes of the flowers, photography and arts section in addition to creating new ideas to attract our younger residents. There follows a great deal of planning in advance of the event. Booking the village hall, arranging for village signs, posters, prize cards and prize money is a start. Then there are judges to be confirmed, trophies to be retrieved, and Pat's endless task of trudging around the village collecting sponsorship money and raffle prizes. A lot of work is involved and Pat receives a lot of support not least from husband Jeff, but also from the many residents who undertake specific tasks in the days preceding the Show but by then Pat has laid the groundwork.

The Friday evening before the event sees a loyal group setting up the tables, bringing some down from the village hall loft and placing the covers on them. Class numbers mark entry places and the hall is ready.

Saturday morning at 8.30 am Pat is back at the village hall ready to receive the early entrants. She produces a superb chart which identifies the entrants and their class in the Show. Help is on hand

to check people in and direct them to the right spot. It is a hectic time until 11.30 when entries close.

At midday the judges arrive and the hall becomes quiet as coloured spots mark prize winning entries. Then it is a rush to get the cards written and placed on the entries to be ready to open at 2.30 pm. As the Show opens, the list of trophy winners has been completed, photographs taken, the kettle is bubbling and people pour in. But Pat does not stop. She checks the trophies, makes sure the raffle prizes are in order and discusses the afternoon programme with the Master of Ceremonies.

After the presentation of awards, the raffle is drawn and then the auction of the produce takes place. As people make their way home there is the clearing up and returning the tables and covers to their home for another year. By 5.30pm the hall is back to normal, Pat has been on duty for 9 hours and the Show is recorded as a success. Pat has agreed with her group the recipients of the proceeds and these go to village organisations.

The 2010 Show was as good as ever. An excellent atmosphere prevailed, there were more outdoor attractions than in previous years, the British Legion greeted visitors at the gate as they have done for years, hundreds of raffle tickets were sold, the cream teas were sold out and many people walked home clutching trophies, raffle prizes and auction produce.

Pat was thanked and presented with an orchid. She will be a hard act to follow and we wish the village hall committee, who are taking over the Show, our very best wishes, confident they will carry on the spirit of this popular event.







# LONG WHATTON & DISEWORTH PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



Our Police Community Support Officer Nicola Stanhope reported on quite a substantial increase in crime in the villages. Villagers are asked to be extra vigilant, reporting anything untoward to the police, including such things as car registration numbers. There has been a spate of thefts of items from gardens in Kegworth and Long Whatton. Once again, keeping an eye open in your neighbourhood might help to solve this problem.

The Chairman reported on a successful Long Whatton Village Show. He particularly noted that the Tug-of-War had been won by a Diseworth team! Co-operation between the organisers and Coalville Wheelers Cycling Club helped to overcome problems during the clear-up on the following day, though there was one unfortunate incident which was reported to a Club official.

Preliminary consideration was given to details of the arrangements for the management of the allotments in Diseworth, due to be available at the beginning of next year. The proposals will then be discussed with prospective tenants at a meeting arranged in October. (NB: Anyone from Long Whatton or Diseworth may still register their interest with the undersigned).

Various actions arising from the recent RoSPA annual inspection of the play areas were agreed. Attempts by the Council to keep the garden area better maintained at The Cross in Diseworth have been frustrated because the contractor who made a start earlier in the year has withdrawn due to the state in which he found it upon his recent return. Councillors are looking at possible alternatives.

County Highways had been very helpful in dealing with questions raised by Councillors at a site meeting about the proposals for speed reduction measures in Long Whatton. The Council has formally welcomed the proposals but has asked that any detailed concerns expressed by individual residents should be taken fully into account.

As part of the Bill Bryson “Stop the Drop” initiative, the Leicestershire Branch of the Campaign to Protect Rural England is seeking to recruit Parish Litter Wardens to whom a nominal annual payment would be made. # For Healthy Salads

## *Think Baby Shoots and Leaves*

We all know that salad is good for us, many of us pile our plates high with it believing that the more of it we eat the healthier we will be, but the good news for people that don't enjoy chomping their way through mountains of leaves, is that in the salad world less is sometimes more.



According to research by food scientists, the most nutritious salad leaves are baby ones, not yet grown to maturity. All leaves are nutritious because they contain a wide range of vitamins, minerals and phytochemicals including: carotenoids beta carotene, lutein and zeaxanthin. Beta carotene is an excellent source of vitamin A essential for healthy skin and vision, while lutein and zeaxanthin are important for healthy eyes.

These nutrients are highly concentrated in leaves that are exposed to light, so if you take a mature iceberg lettuce, the most nutritious leaves are on the outside of it, as they have been exposed to light. Yet these leaves are usually discarded in favour of the pale tender inner ones which are not so nutritious. Young plants usually consist of a few loosely gathered leaves which are all exposed to the sunshine. This is why baby leaves are better for us.

This is good news, as even though the days are shortening, baby leaves are quite easy to grow through the winter even if you don't have a greenhouse, a sunny windowsill will do. Sprinkle a few mixed salad seeds into a pot of compost, cover finely with more compost and water well. Then stand on the windowsill and wait for the seeds to germinate. In a few weeks you should have leaves to eat and sowing a new pot every two weeks should ensure fresh leaves as long as there is enough warmth and sunlight. Different types and colours of leaves give a wide range of nutrients, as well as looking attractive on the plate and many other baby vegetables have similar health benefits. Baby spinach is rich in folic acid, Vitamins, A, C, K and E, plus magnesium, potassium and calcium. Lambs lettuce contains omega 3 oil and Romaine is high in Vitamin A and lutein. Young watercress contains high levels of calcium. Last but not least is the pea shoot, the curly leaves of the immature garden pea vine. Weight for weight, these shoots contain seven more times Vitamin C than oranges.

The most important thing to remember is to eat a wide variety of leaves that have been exposed to as much sunlight as possible. I'm off to hunt through my seed packets to see what goodies I can grow over the autumn and winter.

## Don't Miss Closing Date for School Places

Parents are being urged to look out for school place application packs which will be landing on doormats across Leicestershire in early September. Around 14,000 forms will be sent out to parents whose children will transfer schools in the autumn term, 2011 and the County Council is urging them to make sure they apply on time. This covers pupils moving from infant to junior, primary to high or high to upper schools in Leicestershire.

Transfer to the next school is not automatic so all parents need to apply – even for their child to attend the catchment area school for their home address. Late applicants may not be offered a place at any of their preferred schools, or even their catchment area school.

Parents need to apply by 31st October, 2010 and can do so in two ways:

- online at [www.leics.gov.uk/admissions](http://www.leics.gov.uk/admissions) or
- by returning their application form in the post

Ivan Ould, Leicestershire County Council's Cabinet Member for the Children and Young People's Service, said: "It is very important that all parents apply on time to give their children the best possible chance of being offered a place at their preferred school.

"Last year, we were very successful in meeting parents' preferences but as always, late applicants run the risk of disappointment as schools do become full."

Last year's primary admission figures have not yet been calculated but at secondary level, 96.5% of parents who applied on time received their first preference making Leicestershire one of the top performing authorities in this respect in the country.

The County Council encourages parents to apply via the website and last year 52.5% of transfer applications were made online.

The admissions process adheres to central government rules and gives parents the right to have an appeal heard by an independent panel.
